

Main Obstacles today


- Volatile and changing political regulations
- 2025: Anticipation of further restrictions (flights, finance, visa, travel warnings)
- Difficulties to obtain Visa for Cubans to travel to US
- US Restrictions on services & In Cuba: Internet speed and stability
- Traditional funding sources decreased Private Donations?
- In Cuba: economic, energy, transportation & migration crisis and inflation complicates logistics & planning
