Find solutions to shared problems (migration, medical, environment, race, gender, inequalities)





U.S. STUDENTS STUDYING ABROAD, 1989/90–2023/24



In 2023/24, the total number of U.S. students who studied abroad for academic credit **increased by 6% to 298,180 students.**


US Students Study Abroad

Significance of studying in Cuba

Few destinations in global south

sovereign, independent nation (defiant of US hegemony)

Target of US economic war and sanctions for 60+ years

revolution with socialist projection

internationalism

shared & entangled history with US

shares many problems with US (environment, migration, legacy of slavery, epidemics, narcotics, etc.)

Main Obstacles today

- Hostile, politicized and polarized climate
- Very restrictive political regulations
- Terror-List, Travel Warnings, Restricted Entities
- Banking / payments
- Academic Visa / Travel impossibility for Cubans
- Internet Restrictions
- No more traditional funding
- In Cuba: Energy, Inflation/Exchange Rate, Transportation, Hygiene and Health, Emigration, Internet instability


